Medications

All drugs have potential side effects and should only be used when the risk of taking the drug has been weighed against the benefit being obtained. Although drugs account for only a very small percentage of problems in newborns, the most sensitive time in the infant's development is the first few weeks when a woman may not know that she is pregnant.

The following list of over-the-counter medications are generally considered safe in pregnancy:

Sudafed, Robitussin CF, Vicks Vapor Rub, Ocean Mist nasal spray, Zyrtec or Zyrtec-D, Claritin or Claritin-D, Flonase, Nasacort AQ, Benadryl	Robitussin, cough drops
Insomnia	Yeast Infections
Benadryl, Unisom	3 to 7 day antifungal - Monistat, Gyne-Lotrimin
Hemorrhoids	Toothache
Preparation H, Tucks, Anusol	Orajel, Novacaine, Tylenol
Diarrhea	Constipation
Imodium (1 dose - notify office if persists)	Fiber supplements - FiberCon, Fiber Choice, Citrucel, Metamucil, Fiberall Stool softeners - Colace or Surfak, Miralax
Itching	Acne
Benadryl, Zyrtec, hydrocortisone cream	Benzoyl Peroxide (Clearasil) or Salicylic acid products
Lice Treatments	Sore Throat
Rid DO NOT USE: Kwell	Tylenol, Tylenol Extra-Strength, cough drops, Chloraseptic
