THE BRIDGE'S HISTORY

- The Trent River Bridge has stood through two world wars, witnessed the transformative World's Fair Expo '74, and endured countless flood, wind, snow and ice events.
- The Luten Arch style bridge was one of the first concrete bridges spanning the Spokane River, and one of 12 built in the city between 1907 and 1917
- The current bridge replaced a wooden structure resting on wooden pilings, with warped and twisted main timbers. Users were warned to cross only at walking speed.

MITIGATING ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

 The prime contractor Garco Construction, Inc. plans to mitigate construction noise, and impacts to the adjacent building, wildlife, and the river.

CLOSURES AND DETOURS

The bridge will be closed starting June 1, 2020, until Fall, 2023

- Starting June 1, traffic along Trent Avenue/ SR 290 between Hamilton Street and North Iron Court will be detoured.
- Columbus and Iron Court will remain open so that delivery trucks can travel in the area
- River access will be open to the sheriff department
- WSDOT will ensure that limited access and closures of the roads and river are communicated broadly and well in advance.

PROJECT INFORMATION

- The bridge has been in service since 1910 and is well beyond its expected service life. In its current condition it requires extensive maintenance and repairs.
- The project is complex because it requires the preservation of an adjacent, currently occupied building along with closures of roads, bridges, and the river.
- Demolition and construction will be slow because of the bridge design, short construction season, and limited times for in-water work.
- Trent will be resurfaced from Hamilton to the new Martin Luther King Way roundabout.
- When little construction seems to be happening, crews may be working installing foundations under the bridge or clearing out materials in the river.
- There may be times when the crew isn't working due to river impacts, high flows, etc.


