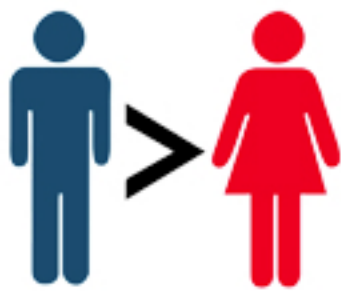


6 BLADDER CANCER FACTS

Though it is less common in women, bladder cancer is the fourth most common cancer in men. What to know:



9 out of 10 people diagnosed with bladder cancer are over age 55



The chance of a man developing bladder cancer in his lifetime is 1 in 27; for women it's 1 in 89



People who smoke are three times more likely to develop bladder cancer than people who don't smoke



Approximately half of bladder cancers are diagnosed when the cancer is still in the first, inner bladder wall layer

The incidence of bladder cancer is higher in White people than it is in those who are Black or Hispanic



Blood in the urine (hematuria) is usually the first sign of bladder cancer in most cases - though other conditions that aren't cancer can cause hematuria too. **If you have blood in your urine, talk to your doctor right away.**
