## **Post-Op Ingrown Nail Surgery Instructions**

- You have had a chemical destruction of the nail root so that the nail will not regrow. This is
  intended to be a permanent procedure. Chemical wounds typically drain up to 2 weeks; in
  some people this may last for up to 2 months. In most cases it will become redder, swollen
  and look like an infection. This is the normal process. It will look better after a few days.
  - a. If you simply had the nail plate removed, without the chemical, your wound will heal more quickly and the nail is intended to grow back.
- The day of surgery stay off your feet as much as possible. Elevating your foot may be helpful.
- 3. Wait until the third day to remove the dressing, then soak for 15 minutes in the following solution (you may remove the dressing during the soak):
  - a. 3 Tablespoons Epsom salt to 1 quart cool water. The salt should sting a little. Do not use hot water.
  - Gently wash the site with a cotton swab to remove the crusted drainage. It will be tender. Gently dry the area & apply a small amount of Polysporin, then a Band-Aid.
     Use additional gauze if heavy drainage.
- Follow this routine twice daily until the drainage stops.
- 5. Do not leave the surgery site exposed.
- Do not use Hydrogen Peroxide or apply any other salve as this may delay the healing process.
- 7. In case of pain take 2 Advil, Motrin or Tylenol follow instructions on the bottle.
- Wear open toe shoes or sandals until closed toe shoes can be tolerated.
- Keep your scheduled follow-up appointment. Your wound will be evaluated for proper healing and we may change the cleansing protocol as indicated.
- 10. Please call our office with any concerns or questions, such as:
  - a. Pain that does not subside with medication.
  - b. Red streaks coming up the foot toward the ankle.
  - c. Fever or nausea.
